


CRIME SURVIVORS HELP NEEDED!



BYLAWS UPDATES NEEDED

This information on bylaws was recently provided by our CFWC President, Sonya Matties. I think every club needs this information. Should you have questions, please contact me.

While you have been busy setting up programs and projects for this club year, it is also really important to examine your bylaws. The bylaws are the cornerstone of your organization and without clear bylaws, you can often run into problems. If you have recently changed the way you do things, changed officer or chairman titles and/or responsibilities, added new positions in the organization, and/or have not reviewed your bylaws in the last two years or so, it's time to do so now.

According to Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, bylaws are the most important rules which an organization must compose for itself. The bylaws should protect the



right of a member, present or absent, and must include what control those attending a regular or specially called meeting have to act for the entire membership. If you have a Board of Directors and/or an Executive Committee, their responsibilities and duties must be stated.

Choose a bylaws committee and a chairman. Generally, the committee should be large. The members on this committee should be those members who are most fair, who can see two sides to every question, and who are flexible in their thinking. You will also need at least one person who is capable of writing in the manner of your current bylaws. If you have a qualified parliamentarian, it may be helpful to have her on the committee or to use her as a resource.

The first step is to read the entire bylaws. By doing this, you may see conflicting statements or the same statements in two different places. This should be changed. Do the bylaws reflect your organization as it currently operates? Are only the most important rules included? Don't forget, less important rules can be part of the Standing Rules. Standing Rules are related to details, rather than parliamentary procedure and can be changed at any meeting by a majority vote. Things like meeting time, hostess duties, or the order of business at a meeting belong in Standing Rules.

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Things that belong in bylaws, but are often left out:

- The amount of dues and any other required financial obligation. By having this in the bylaws, the entire membership would have to vote to change it.
- The number of members that constitute a quorum. While Robert's Rules allows such designations as "majority of members", this chairman recommends a numeral be used. If you have lost and/or gained members, and want to start your meeting, it may be confusing or inaccurate to try to figure out if you have a majority or some percentage of your members present. If you use a numeral, such as 24, all you have to do is count. A rule of thumb when deciding on the correct number for a quorum is to figure out how many members you usually have at a meeting, except in bad weather. Then subtract a few and that can be your quorum. You want a relatively small number.
- The procedure to be followed in case of the resignation or loss of an officer.
- How and when special committees are created
- How/if/when a meeting can be conducted electronically.

Once the amendments to the bylaws have been written up by the committee (and approved by the Board of Directors or Executive Committee if that is the procedure in your organization), then every member must receive a written copy of the proposed amendments with time to read them before a vote is taken. Generally, the written copies are distributed the month before they are voted on, but you may have a different procedure in your current bylaws. A two-thirds affirmative vote by those present and voting is needed to accept an amendment.

COVENANT HOUSE

I would like to introduce you to Covenant House, an organization that helps young people who are homeless or survivors of trafficking across America. They offer services and shelter. Here in Orange County, they have a house in Anaheim. Covenant House offers food, shelter, medical care, safety and love, 24/7. They offer long term support to help these young people heal, rebuild meaningful lives and go on to have brighter futures.

California's Homeless Youth are young persons of ages 12 to 17 who are living apart from a parent or guardian and young adults ages 18 to 24 who are economically and/or emotionally detached from their families. These would include runaways, expelled youths who are told to leave their homes, and/or ones who have aged out of foster care. Often, they are abandoned, or deserted, sometimes released from the juvenile justice system. Some are homeless for short periods, while others have spent a significant amount of time on the street. The longer a young person spends without shelter or support, the more susceptible they are to sexual abuse, exploitation and drug abuse.

The number of homeless youths in California is always changing. It is estimated nationally, 1.6 to 2.1 million youth are homeless age 12 to 24, the number of those age 12 to 17 is 1.6 to 1.7 million. This is over the course of one year. Where 300,000 to 400,000 might be homeless for a single day. In California that number is 200,000 any given day.

It is easy to see how homeless youth in California could use the services offered by Covenant House. I hope your club will take on the task of helping this worthwhile charity.

IMPACTING YOUR COMMUNITY

The Community Impact Program is probably the least used program in GFWC. This is because it requires a club to develop their own project and not just donate money and/or items to another charity. Yet this project can be an excellent way for clubs to gain new members and to make a special mark in their community.

Because this program is a 2 year program, clubs have a whole year ahead to start a Community Impact Project.

Here are some steps to develop a project:

- 1. Discover a need in your community.
- 2. Research the need with input from the community.
- 3. Write a Goal Statement describing a clear view of what is to be accomplished by the project and what benefits will be gained.
- 4. List Funding needed for the project and possible sources.
- 5. Develop a Timeline for the project.
- 6. Set up Community Connections to help with the project.
- 7. Promote the project with different media.
- 8. Record the project steps as you complete them.

HOLIDAY DANGER!

Holidays are often a time of joy and community, but for people with an abusive partner, the holidays (or even a long weekend) can be stressful and dangerous. Spending time with family and friends, dealing with extra stress, and traveling can challenge safety planning during any holiday or long weekend. Family and friends may struggle to help or support the survivor during this time. We suggest safety planning for holidays and weekends to help families and survivors feel safer during these moments.

What to know: Many survivors feel isolated by their unhealthy or abusive partners. Connecting with family and friends can be an important step in healing.

Tips for a survivor: Create a plan to keep checking in with someone during a holiday or long weekend. You can also create a code word, which allows you to let someone know you need help without tipping off their partner. Be sure to agree on what action the code word calls for:

Consider brainstorming reasons to get out, like helping someone with holiday plans or shopping; you can get creative with these ideas. You can call The Hotline at **1-800-799-7233** for creative ideas on safety planning for a holiday or a long weekend.

Tips for a family member or friend:

It can help to discuss safe times and ways to communicate. You might consider if there are times during the day when the survivor is typically away from their abusive partner. Or it might be safer for them to email or text rather than call. (It's best to make sure the abusive partner does not have access to the survivor's email account or phone before using these methods to communicate).

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It may feel instinctual for family or friends to say an abusive partner is not welcome at a holiday function. You have the right to say who is or isn't welcome in your home but understand that isolation is a powerful tactic of abuse. If the abusive partner cannot come, they may not let the survivor visit either.

Emotional support and safety planning can help both you and the survivor move forward. Keep in mind you can talk or chat with a Hotline advocate to figure out what works best for vou.

Tips for a family member or friend:

Seeing someone you care about being hurt is also stressful. Remind yourself that you can't make decisions for someone else, but you can ask a survivor what they need and offer help. We do our best helping when we are taking care of ourselves, so try to make your own plans to get rest, get good nutrition, talk to supportive friends and do things you enjoy.

Transitional clients collaborate closely with a therapist and case manager to work towards their goals, which may involve achieving financial stability, enrolling in an educational program, obtaining employment, or securing permanent housing, among other objectives.

Access is coordinated with your emergency shelter case manager.



Zip books are books from Amazon that you return to your local library when you are done reading them. No catch. It is a Grant Program by the California State Library. This program concludes June 30, 2025 or when funds run out.





There are parameters as with anything.

- You must have a library card in good standing with OC Public Libraries.
- You are limited to ordering 2 books a month and 2 checked out at a time.
- Titles must be shipped from Amazon.
- Titles must be sold by Amazon or a USA third party seller
- No overseas sellers

New Print books must be valued under \$50, New World Language books can be valued at \$75. Books should not be available at our library (no prepublication orders or anything published with in the last 12 months). Alternate formats (such as large Print or in another language) are okay to order.

To order, go to OC Libraries and complete their form. You may want to look at the Amazon catalog. Enjoy your book and after three weeks return it to the library.


GARDEN GROVE OFFICE DEPOT CLOSURE




